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For the teacher...

Many teachers have used these effective activities to teach texture. These can easily be incorporated into any 5 senses unit. Many of you will use it to teach language and textile learning. In this set of printables, you will find that half of the activities have the textures labeled. This allows your student to match samples to the texture it has. The other half of the printables does not have the texture labeled. These options allow you as the teacher to encourage students to write their descriptive words telling the texture of the sample. It also allows you to use textures that I didn't have listed.

Some textures to investigate before this activity might include but are not limited to fluffy, fuzzy, silky, velvety, squishy, prickly, gritty, crunchy, slimy, smooth, rough, soft, bumpy, sticky, hard, crunchy, gritty, scratchy.

Some items to use for hands-on learning might include but are not limited to scraps of different fabrics (fleece, silk, cotton, corduroy, felt), scraps of different papers (sandpaper, construction paper, crepe tissue paper), small objects from outdoors (twigs, leaves, pebbles, bark), small items from around the house (coins, bottle caps, buttons, pastas, candies, yarn), glues, puffy paint, Velcro, glitter, tape, aluminum foil, wax paper, etc.

In many of the activity sheets, the student will glue different items on the fingers and or hands to show different textures.
